What I can say is that the overriding preference from nearly all of the survey respondents is to maintain your children in home learning either until a move to level 2 or until further clarity around level 3 is provided. It has certainly given us a good feel for the school community view and when we have more information it will inform our decisions around the school plan.

Awhina - Helping others to be the best they can be

Thank you to all of you who have supported and encouraged the home learning of students. There are high levels of engagement with all families accounted for. The teachers remain enthusiastic and active in the provision of the learning tasks and report that they are enjoying the process although the virtual classroom is a long way short of the physical classroom. Fingers crossed we will be through this soon.

As far as a timeline goes, following the announcement this afternoon, I will receive a formal direction from the Ministry of Education. Tania and I, in consultation with the school leaders, will plan the school response and consult with the BoT chairperson before advising the teachers and then the community. I would predict this will happen before Wednesday afternoon and I will share with you all the information you can then use to reach an informed decision around school for your child(ren).



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
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
